

Research

The value of health awareness days, weeks and months: A systematic review

Health awareness campaigns are popular and widespread, with over 300 occurring globally each year, yet their effectiveness in improving health outcomes needs to be determined. Research suggests that while these campaigns can increase knowledge and online discussions, few lead to tangible health benefits. This systematic review analyzed quantitative studies on the potential value and effectiveness of health awareness days, weeks and months. Read more



Health Awareness Days: Sufficient Evidence to Support the Craze?



Health awareness campaigns are very common, with almost 200 listed on the US National Health Observances calendar and many related bills in Congress. However, these campaigns often aren't properly evaluated and might not consider how bigger factors, like the environment or access to resources, affect health. Without careful review, health awareness days could give the wrong idea

that poor health results from bad choices, rather than larger issues. This analysis provides suggestions on how to make these campaigns more effective.

<u>Impact of Breast Cancer Awareness Month on Public Interest in the United States</u> <u>between 2012 and 2021: A Google Trends Analysis</u>

This study used Google Trends data to measure public awareness of breast, lung, and prostate cancers during their respective awareness months from 2012 to 2021. The findings show that Breast Cancer Awareness Month (BCAM) significantly increased public awareness of breast cancer, while Lung Cancer and Prostate Cancer Awareness Months had no impact on awareness of their respective cancers. BCAM may serve as a successful model for other health awareness campaigns. Read more

Why did you join the Utah Health Literacy Coalition? I wanted to network with other individuals who are passionate about health literacy in our state and learn from those who have been working in this field for years. I loved seeing all the progress that was being made in the community and I wanted to help where and how I could.

Briefly explain some health literacy projects you have worked on this year.

With my position at the University of Utah, I am working to improve and grow patient education and health literacy projects throughout the University health system, including the University of Utah's Main Hospital, Huntsman Mental Health Institute, and Nelson Rehabilitation Hospital. I also, on occasion, have the privilege of working with Jeff Yancy and his team at Huntsman Cancer Institute and Jane Sims and her team at Intermountain Health to create patient education for both of our medical centers.

With my position here at UHLC as policy and advocacy led, I am working on a proclamation for Governor Cox to acknowledge October as Utah's Health Literacy Month. I also have the privilege of working on the advocacy unit at the Utah Public Health Association, and I hope this is the first of many steps to help create state-wide laws or guidelines requiring all patient-facing medical information to be written in plain language.

What is your favorite part of being part of the Utah Health Literacy Coalition? I love the passion that everyone working in public health and advocacy has to improve outcomes for others. Everyone's drive to think outside the box and solve the issues that affect everyone is encouraging and empowering. Keep it up!!
