This presentation was delivered at the IHA conference by Carolyn Catilli and her colleagues from Penn Medicine. They share their curriculum, which focuses on patient education through techniques such as "teach-back," cultural competence, and empathy

development. The curriculum includes a mixture of didactic content, patient panels, role play, and simulations with standardized patients to ensure that healthcare professionals can effectively communicate and enhance patient engagement. The program is not merely a one-time event but aims to instill a culture of continuous learning, where patient interactions—regardless of the duration or setting—are seen as opportunities for effective communication and education.



A Delphi study on health literacy competencies for health professionals

Experts from Switzerland, Austria, and Germany identified 14 core competencies for health professionals regarding health literacy, categorized into knowledge, skills, and attitude. Key competencies include understanding health literacy's importance, using clear communication, engaging patients, recognizing cultural barriers, and emphasizing effective communication for quality care. These findings lay the foundation for assessing professional health literacy, integrating it into curricula, and developing targeted training programs.

Professional responsiveness to health literacy: A scoping review



We found 14 definitions and 10 categories of professional responsiveness to health literacy. Professional responsiveness to health literacy was characterized as knowing the definition and implications of health literacy for the patient's well-being and being able to develop, adapt, implement, and evaluate health education strategies. Nineteen strategies were mapped for

education to ensure professional responsiveness to health literacy.

<u>Health literacy competency requirements for health professionals: a Delphi consensus study in Taiwan</u>

This study led to the identification of key health literacy competencies that can serve as measurable learning objectives for designing a health literacy curriculum for health professionals. The prioritized health literacy practices can act as benchmarks for the competencies health professionals should acquire and consistently apply in clinical settings.

Amber gave a presentation on health literacy expectations and impacts to the tutors, and we answered questions and provided useful tips.

What was the outcome of those projects?

The tutors were given more resources and suggestions for their one-on-one sessions with adults from marginalized communities. The Utah Health Literacy Coalition connected with Project Read, which operates in Salt Lake and Utah County.
